Ken Cheslock put two coats of primer on. I then put two coats of white paint on. Leonard Lowe painted the red stripes. Jim Ward picked up new guy wires and turnbuckles. We got a crew together and put the wind-tee back in place. It looks and works great. It shouldn't need any further attention for many years. The entire project took a couple of months. Thanks fellows for a job well done. I will leave the details of the other projects for the directors directly involved. It's getting towards the end of September and we should be able to keep the water on until the end of October. The fall weather around here is usually quite nice, hurricanes aside! It was a busy summer on the field. The new pumphouse has now been erected. Fantastic job; thanks to Josh Dykens for heading this project and all others who helped.





The wind tee has been reinstalled on its pedestal. Much thought and new ideas went into the repairs which should provide a longer life span. There were several members involved, with Kevin Layden heading this project. Thanks very much to all.



Wires were run underground to power another access point and speakers on the east end of the field. Results during the Fly-In were positive.

I checked the field over the Friday of the Fly-In and I can't recall it looking any better than it did that weekend. Thank you volunteers; you came through once again.

I am working on getting a company to supply a drum for our used oil. Once this is in place, all oil will be disposed of by GFL Environmental free of charge.

We are also testing an OOMA phone system in the club-house. The temporary number is 902-608-5333. Feel free

to call this number if you are calling the clubhouse. Also, anyone in the clubhouse can use this phone at no charge to make calls to the rest of Canada and the US. Please test if you get a chance and forward your comments back to me on phone quality. In a few more weeks the directors will be deciding if we will keep this system or not.

We will hold out as long as possible before we winterize the trailer line and clubhouse. It was close to November last year before we shut the lines down. Please come to Stanley and use the facilities; fall is the best time of year.

On a personal note, I've purchased a Zenith CH-300 project. It was inspected by MDRA recently. There are a few snags, but for the most part the inspector was quite satisfied with the work. The snags will be delt with first and then I plan to start installing the wiring, instruments and some paint. Should be at the field and assembled sometime late 2023.

Fuel Report

The new tank inspection hatch cover made by Mark MacDonald was fitted by myself and David Rahman. This has greatly reduced the amount of rainwater entering the berm and will help limit corrosion. At the same time, a gate valve

was fitted to the berm drain enabling removal of any water from the berm while arresting any leakage of fuel.

Fuel sales have returned to pre-pandemic levels, boosted by a healthy turnout for the fly-in. However, some users have gone back to mogas, which is now cheaper than Avgas.

We've ordered a top up of 4,500 litres, which should arrive early next week, at which time I'll read the meters and issue invoices. We hope the next batch will come in cheaper enough to allow a price reduction at the pump, but as usual (if not somewhat bizarrely) we do not get the exact price until the day the fuel is delivered. Stanley loses another senior member

Stanley Sport Aviation lost another senior member with the passing of **Thomas (Tom) Rodger Forsyth** August 31, 2022. Tom passed

away peacefully in the Halifax Infirmary, QEII, at the age of 92, after a sudden illness, "stopping his perpetual forward motion," according to his obituary.

A long-standing member of the club, Tom grew up in Lutterworth, England, and Glasgow, Scotland. He joined the Merchant Marine at 18 and sailed the world. He and his vivacious wife Sheila

(Mason) moved to Canada in 1958, with Tom having obtained a job with the Canadian Coast Guard. They were proud and loving parents of five children and devoted grandparents of 10 grandchildren.

Tom was constantly active. He built a house in North Sydney, then a sailboat and dingy, made additions to the family home in Halifax and built a house in Spryfield. Even after retiring at 69, Tom continued to remain active. Among other activities, he was building an ultralight aircraft, spending time at Stanley Airport, flying with fellow plane enthusiasts. Even after Sheila died in 2015, Tom didn't slow down. He travelled to Russia, South Africa, Mexico, and Great Britain. He played bridge often at the bridge club, and spent a lot of time with family and with friends at Stanley Airport. Up until a week before he passed he was buying supplies for a living space he built into his hangar at Stanley.

As his obituary noted, "Tom believed in the power of the human will, and lived every day to the fullest." He will be missed by his children and grandchildren as well as his 'Stanley family.'

Tom's passing follows shortly after the anniversary of the passing of **Ronald (Ron) Edward Seeley** on August

10,2021, at the age of 83. Ron was one of SSAA's earliest members and he held numerous positions over the years including President.

Ron's talent for drawing allowed him to draw many crests for the flying club, but what he is most known for is the design of the word "STANLEY," which is mowed into the center of the airfield to welcome pilots on their approach.
