remain extra vigilant. Despite this, the flying conditions themselves were exceptional. With firm, dry runways and calm weather, many of our members and guests made the most of the season, logging hours and enjoying the skies under near-ideal flying circumstances.

As always, the Stanley Sport Aviation Association and CCW4 welcomed pilots and aviation enthusiasts from far and wide to our well-known fly-ins. This year, we proudly hosted the 54th Annual Labour Day Fly-In. Thankfully, the weather cooperated and provided good conditions throughout the weekend.

We welcomed many displays, CASARA (Civilian Air Search and Rescue) and local fire departments to mention a few. Our forum on local Floyd Wile taught visitors about his contributions to the war effort. It was a big hit with locals and travellers.

We were thrilled to see a great turnout of aircraft and folks driving in. By noon on Saturday, the parking lot was full and approximately 40 planes filled the infield. Many pilots also took advantage of the chance

This summer has been among the driest in recent memory. In 2023, our area received a total rainfall exceeding 48 inches, whereas as of mid-September this year we've recorded only about 16 inches.

sential for fire prevention.

With these dry conditions, government restrictions were put in place—no open fires and no walks in the woods. While these measures may be inconvenient, they are essential for fire prevention. Propane fire pits are recommended as a safer alternative.

Despite these precautions, a fire incident occurred near the airfield when wind toppled a tree onto power lines, igniting the tree and causing the fire to spread to the ground. Thanks to the quick response of the SSAA fire brigade and the assistance of others, the fire was contained until professional firefighters arrived. Had the fire grown larger, windy conditions could have threatened the airfield—a close call for all involved. On a positive note, the reduced need for field mowing due to dry weather has resulted in some fuel savings.

Just before the Fly-In, several projects were completed by many dedicated Stanley volunteers. There included repairs to the clubhouse, painting of the fuel system, modifications and tire replacements for the hay wagon, Runway 27 asphalt patching and runway number repainting, installation of a new windsock, Fly-In preparation projects, and modification and clear marking of recycle bins.

These improvements have enhanced the safety and appearance of our airfield, reflecting the dedication of our volunteers and the strength of our community. A sincere thank you to all who contributed their time and efforts to these projects.

Members and their guests are asked to ensure their pets are leashed at all times and that they promptly clean up their pet waste as a matter of

respect and hygiene for all at the airfield. Pet waste was recently found between the 305 (21) hangar and the fuel system, where pilots could accidentally tread in it and track it into their aircraft. Elsewhere, campers might track pet waste into their trailers. Prompt removal, wherever it is, is a required consideration for all.

Exciting developments now are underway at our airfield. A new private hangar is under construction, and work has begun on the new club multi-purpose building. Significant resources have been allocated to ensure these projects progress smoothly. During construction,

there may be disruptions to power and increased activity near the driveway. Please drive slowly and respect the work zones.

Many individuals have contributed both on-site and behind the scenes to organize and facilitate these developments—thank you for your commitment.

Requests for hangar space continue to be received, with some owners expressing interest in building new hangars. This ongoing growth may lead to a very different-looking airfield in the years ahead. Aviation remains vibrant in our area, and all members are encouraged to participate and enjoy the facilities in whatever way they can.

Two members have returned their fuel keys and these have been re-issued to new members.

Fuel sales have been brisk over the summer, with 4000 liters pumped since the end of July. Another top-up has been ordered; this should see us through the fall season.

The tank berm appears to be holding up to the elements well and has had a complete re-paint, which

should ensure it continues to do so. The inner tank also looks good and there are no signs of corrosion. The pump filters will be replaced before the cooler months, but at this time show no evidence of water. So far we have dodged the return of the carbon tax, so we do not see a price increase at this time, but the budget has yet to be delivered! Enjoy Fall flying!
